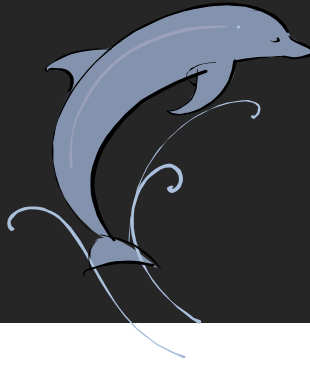

Burn Awareness Month



Please take a moment to talk to your kids about burns – how they happen and how to prevent them. Burns can occur in the home or when kids use matches or lighters. Unlike broken bones and cuts, which heal over time, burn injuries are permanent and can have long-term effects on a person's appearance or ability to move.

Burns – How they happen:

Thermal burns – happen when kids touch something hot (fireplace, flames, oven, ...) or come into contact with flames from burning items (matches, lighters, candles, ...). Scald burns are caused by steam or hot liquids – including hot beverages, boiling water, bath water, and hot water from faucets in the home.

Electrical burns – happen when an electrical current makes contact with the body.

Friction burns – happen on treadmills, slides, vacuum cleaners and trampolines.

Burns – How to prevent them:

Make sure you keep matches and lighters locked up and out of reach from your kids.

Keep hot liquids away from kids.

Never allow kids to do "adult" jobs like cooking, lighting a grill, lighting the fireplace or lighting candles. Maintain a "3 Foot Safety Zone" around heating and cooking appliances. Mark off the zone if you have young children in your home.

Teach young children to tell an adult when they find matches or lighters.

Be sure to set your water heater at 120 degrees or lower. Bath water for children should not exceed 100 degrees.

Keep kids away from treadmills.

In Colorado, children ages 10 and older can be charged with the felony crime of Arson for intentionally starting a fire. Please discuss the dangers of fire setting with your child. IMPORTANT IMMUNIZATION INFORMATION

To the parents/Guardians of 5th grade students:

For the school year 2011-2012, Colorado School Entrance and Immunization Law requires that your student’s immunizations are current and that you provide proof of immunization to attend school.

Immunizations for sixth grade entry are:

DtaP/DTP	5 doses OR 4 if 4th dose given on or after 4th birthday
Tdap	1 dose required (NEW REQUIREMENT)
Polio	4 doses OR 3 if 3rd dose was given on or after 4th birthday
Hepatitis B	3 doses
MMR	2 doses
Varicella	1 dose (2 doses recommended) or history of disease

PROOF OF IMMUNIZATIONS will be required at REGISTRATION IN AUGUST 2011.

Please contact your students health care provider as soon as possible to schedule the required immunizations. Please obtain a completed copy of your student’s immunizations from your health care provider at the time of your visit, to bring to school.

Please note, If an immunization is against your religious beliefs, you must sign a religious exemption. If your child cannot receive an immunization for medical reasons, a physician must sign a medical exemption. If you have personal beliefs opposed to an immunization, you must sign a personal exemption. Exemption forms can be found on the reverse side of the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment Certificate of Immunization.

Jefferson County Department of Health and Environment offers immunization services by appointment 303-232-6301. Family Health Line provides information regarding free and low cost immunizations at 303-692-2229 .



The Drug Enforcement Agency recently classified *K2*, *Spice* and other synthetic marijuana substances as illegal and dangerous. If you hear your child talking about *Ivory Wave*, *Black Mamba*, *Spike* or *Mr. Smiley*, all common names for these drugs, you should pay attention.

Recently, the Drug Enforcement Agency listed *Spice* as a Schedule 1 drug, in the same category as marijuana, heroin and LSD. Jeffco Public Schools follows federal guidelines; therefore, if a student is caught using, possessing, giving or sharing any of these substances at school, they will be suspended for five days. The penalty for purchasing or selling them is immediate expulsion. Effective this semester, a second offense within three years from the first offense will result in a mandatory expulsion.

It is very important to know that while these drugs are illegal federally, they are easily found at tobacco shops, convenience stores, novelty shops where drug paraphernalia is sold and online. In many cases, they are sold as incense and labeled “not for human consumption.” Symptoms can include hallucinations, severe agitation, vomiting, elevated heart rate, elevated blood pressure, tremors, seizures, anxiety, numbness and tingling, or pale appearance.

We encourage parents to look for these products in your child’s possession, discuss the dangers and watch for any symptoms. The district’s office of dropout prevention and recovery has helpful information on their website to help you if you suspect your child is using drugs. Your student’s safety and well-being is always our top priority. For more information on student use of drugs and alcohol, refer to the student conduct code book, pages 12-16.

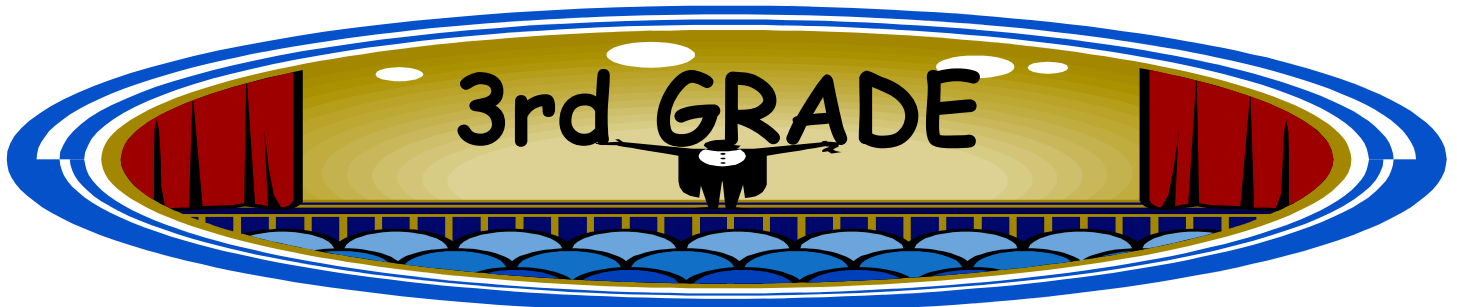

Laurence Pringle grew up in western New York, roaming woods and fields, exploring ponds and creeks. These boyhood experiences led him to earn degrees in wildlife conservation at Cornell University and the University of Massachusetts. Larry was an editor of *Nature and Science*, a children's magazine published at The American Museum of Natural History in New York City. If he hadn't been hired as a rookie editor for that magazine, he might never have written for children. When that magazine ceased publication in 1970, Larry decided to try to survive as a freelance writer. The Chicago Tribune has called him "one of America's top nonfiction writers for young readers," concentrates mainly on biological and environmental subjects. He is the highly acclaimed author of over one hundred books for young people, among them *Sharks! Strange and Wonderful* and *Strange Animals, New to Science*. When he is not gardening, fishing at the ocean's edge, or helping around the house, he gets some writing done. His 108th book was published in the fall of 2010 and more are in the works!

Dear Parents,

When I pick up my children at school and look around at the parked cars, I'm distressed about what I see. So many children, from kindergarten to 6th grade, hop into the front passenger seat and don't put on seatbelts. Then the parent, who also isn't wearing a seatbelt, drives off.

Last August, Colorado passed a new law that all children under age 8 must be properly restrained in a child safety seat when traveling. For violating this law, you can be fined \$82.

I'm sure many people think they don't need to bother with seatbelts when they're just driving a short distance to school. But research shows that most accidents happen within a few miles of your home. Other people say, "Well, I don't buckle in because if there's a fire, I couldn't get out." But most accidents don't result in fires.

Many people don't realize the consequences of riding with no seatbelt. When you're driving at 30 miles per hour and come to a sudden stop, the car will stop, but your body will continue to move forward at 30 miles per hour until it hits a solid object—i.e., the windshield and possibly the tree, pole, or other car that caused the sudden stop. The same will happen to your child; however, your child's head is heavier and he or she becomes a missile. If children are in the front seat or the middle seat, they'll be projected through the windshield. If they're behind you, they'll hit the driver before going through the windshield. If you're in a rollover accident, imagine your body is in a blender. If you're ejected from the vehicle, it may roll over you.

Seatbelts are essential for safe traveling. The five seconds it takes to click it could save you a lifetime of agony and despair. Our hospital recently admitted a young man who wasn't wearing a seatbelt and hit a tree. Now he has a severe brain injury and most likely won't ever walk or talk again. If he had worn a seatbelt, he probably would've had just a laceration on his elbow.

Please take the time to buckle up. It's worth it in the long run!
